Celebrating the 2019 FRS-NJ Certification Cycle

The month of October marks the end of each year’s Future Ready Schools - New Jersey certification cycle, and there is plenty to celebrate!

Over the last few years, the #FutureReadyNJ community has grown beyond the FRS-NJ team’s wildest dreams and expectations. Just over 5,000 educators, leaders, and stakeholders have officially joined the community as members of district and school level Future Ready teams, our supporting organizations, and other individuals across the state of New Jersey that believe in the Future Ready mindset and in best preparing our students for success in college, career, and citizenship in the digital age.

The number of schools and districts involved in the program has grown to over 430 schools from 130+ districts, inclusive of public, charter, and a variety of specialty and independent schools. This year, a record 197 schools from 62 districts submitted for the initial Bronze Tier school certification and another 62 schools from 21 districts submitted for the second level Silver Tier school certification. We also were proud to launch of the Silver District Distinction this year!

Over the last month, we were thrilled to notify and announce the 2019 cohort of Future Ready Schools - New Jersey certified schools and Silver District Distinction Awardees, which are listed in the following pages of this newsletter. We look forward to celebrating them at the 2019 FRS-NJ Awards Ceremony on October 22nd at NJSBA’s Workshop 2019, and we hope you’ll join us there!

We will also be hosting a number of community-led sessions on the exhibit floor at Workshop throughout the 22nd and 23rd.

It has been an absolute honor to serve the #FutureReadyNJ community! You are all an inspiration to myself, the FRS-NJ team, and the rest of the New Jersey’s educational community. You have a lot to celebrate, congratulations to all for your hard work and progress!

Girls Who Code Expands Free Initiatives in New Jersey

Girls Who Code is a leading international non-profit with an ambitious mission – to close the gender gap in technology. The organization spearheads the movement to inspire, educate and equip girls with computing skills to pursue 21st-century opportunities. Why? Today, only 1 in 5 computer science graduates are women. Given this skills gap, many women and girls are not positioned to join the high-paying, high-tech computer science workforce. Girls Who Code is working to disrupt that trajectory. How? With our commitment to diversity, our impact is moving the needle -- Girls Who Code Club alumni are choosing to major in computer science at 15 times the national average. Half of these girls are from historically underrepresented groups. We are rising to the challenge to do more and you can play a meaningful role.

After-School Clubs – Join Our Growing Movement

Girls Who Code Clubs are free programs for 3rd-5th and 6th-12th grade girls, creating a meaningful opportunity for thousands of girls to join our sisterhood of supportive peers and role models to use computer science to change the world. Clubs can be hosted by schools, libraries, non-profits, colleges and more. No computer science experience is required to facilitate a Club. We use an online curriculum with which the girls learn computer science and work together to make a project that impacts their communities. With the expansion of our Clubs program over the last few years and the support of local communities, in the 2018-19 school year Girls Who Code had over 6,500 free Clubs nationally. Girls Who Code Clubs have gained considerable traction in New Jersey as well, embraced by school districts and organizations with whom we have created substantial multi-Club partnerships and a number of individual Clubs throughout the state. The

Club application is open and we are eager to expand our Clubs presence to impact more girls around the world and close to home here in New Jersey.

Summer Immersion Program – Deep Dive for Career Development

Girls Who Code also offers a free 7-week immersive program for 10th and 11th grade girls at top technology companies around the country. New Jersey companies across the state hosted five sites this past summer, providing exciting career building experiences for one hundred girls, twenty at each company site. To ensure our programs are accessible to all girls, Girls Who Code offers need-based stipends to accepted students to help defray transportation costs and other expenses associated with program attendance. Year after year, our alumni rate the Summer Immersion Program as one of their most transformative learning experiences. The application for next year's Summer Immersion Program opens in January 2020.

Women In Tech Lesson Plans – Changing Perceptions

To support efforts at the state level to bring more computer science curriculum into schools, particularly middle schools, Girls Who Code created free Women In Tech Lesson Plans. Our lesson plans are designed to help teachers seamlessly infuse computational thinking into their classrooms. Students explore the hidden histories of women in tech, discuss computer science's impact on the world and uncover how they already think like a computer scientist.

Reach The World: Bringing the World into Classrooms

How are you preparing your students to become curious, confident, compassionate global citizens? What are you doing to ensure that your young learners are prepared to take the jobs of tomorrow, today? [Reach the World](#) (RTW), a New York City-based virtual exchange organization, is a national leader in bringing immersive global experiences into the classroom through its network of volunteer travelers studying, teaching, researching, and exploring abroad. Participating classrooms take advantage of asynchronous and synchronous content created by volunteer travelers in real time that is edited for use in the classroom.

In the 2018-19 school year, RTW took nearly 500 classrooms on virtual exchange journeys to all seven continents, not only exploring the places but the people and cultures that make each location unique. Last winter, students at Lincoln Elementary in Hasbrouck Heights took part in a journey to the [Weddell Sea](#) in Antarctica, one of the most remote places in the world, learning from scientists and crewmembers alike aboard the S.A. Agulhas II. Ms. Capozzi, a School Library Media Specialist and Gifted & Talented teacher at the school said “This experience has broadened our student’s horizons by introducing them to career paths that they may never have had the opportunity to be exposed to. Of course they understood that there were scientists on the Expedition, but they learned about all of the other jobs that were involved like film crew, cooks, public relations, and others...” Reach the World can capture the stories of explorers and others as they happen to show students how they can follow in these role models’ footsteps.



In addition to connecting with explorers on expedition to some of the most remote places in the world, participating educators also have the opportunity to connect their classrooms one on one with college-aged men and women studying, teaching, or researching in a foreign country. As global experiences are inherently interdisciplinary, Reach the World works alongside K-12 educators across all disciplines to facilitate standards-driven, media-rich virtual exchanges to prepare students to be changemakers now and into the future.



Principal Joseph Colangelo of Lincoln Elementary said it best: “Everyone’s goal is global learning. The world is a big place. Reach the World provides a pathway for teachers to get started... Our teachers connected lessons in geography, culture, geology, oceanography, foreign language, history and technology to the expeditions.
